

Who's Running for Collier County Commission District 2 in the General Election

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The Collier County Commission District 2 seat is on the Nov. 3, 2026, ballot for registered voters in the District. Republican incumbent Chris Hall is seeking a second term. His sole challenger is Jeffersonian Party of Florida candidate Cody Davis. The winner will serve a four-year term on the five-member Collier County Board of County Commissioners.

In this post, I summarize the backgrounds and stated priorities of the two candidates seeking the District 2 seat, along with their endorsements, recent news coverage, and campaign finance data, to help voters prepare to cast their ballots. Chris Hall

Republican incumbent Chris Hall was born in Fort Bragg, North Carolina, and grew up as the oldest child in a military family that lived in numerous states, including Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas, Indiana, Alabama, Maryland, Utah, South Carolina, and Florida. He holds a degree in Industrial Distribution (Engineering Sales) from Texas A&M University and has approximately 10 years of experience in electrical distribution. He and his wife also built careers as entrepreneurs in network marketing and real estate investing. ([campaign website](#))

Hall describes himself as a husband of 37 years, father of two sons, and grandfather of seven. He and his wife have served local churches for more than 30 years and are ministers and trainers for the Restoring The Foundations ministry program. ([campaign website](#))

In 2013, Hall survived an airplane crash caused by a faulty fuel pump, an experience he has described as confirming a sense of purpose and destiny not yet fulfilled. He and his wife sold all their holdings in 2021 ahead of his 2022 campaign. ([campaign website](#))

Hall said he decided to run for the County Commission in 2020 after then-commissioner Andy Solis voted in favor of a county mask mandate for local businesses, which Hall opposed. He won a five-way Republican primary and then defeated the Democratic challenger in the general election with more than 70 percent of the vote. He ran unopposed in the August 2026 Republican primary. Platform

Hall's campaign website presents a range of positions and accomplishments rather than a dedicated Issues or Platform page. His stated priorities include fiscal restraint; he says he fought against tax increases and worked to reduce county spending through priority-based budgeting. He has championed private-sector approaches to affordable housing, Conservation Collier land purchases, and the repeal of what he describes as "unnecessary regulations on homeowners and landlords."

Hall has also advocated for what he calls the "Health Freedom Bill of Rights to outlaw mask and vaccine mandates in Collier County" and to return federal COVID relief funds. Additional stated priorities include public safety, measures he describes as protecting conservative social values, and economic development initiatives such as the opening of the Great Wolf Lodge and attracting a professional soccer team to the county. Cody Davis

Jeffersonian challenger Cody Davis describes himself as a historian and election law expert. He grew up in Illinois and has visited Southwest Florida since childhood, when his grandparents spent winters in Fort Myers. He moved to Naples full-time in 2019 along with his family and his grandparents, who also relocated nearby. Davis states that he was homeschooled through both high school and college, focusing his studies on American history, American legal history, and the history of American development. In 2022, Davis started a political action committee called Vote Men PAC to support “electing men.” “We need men to lead and women to follow,” Davis told Palm Beach Post reporter Frank Cerabino in 2023. Vote Men PAC received approximately \$4,000 in contributions between 2022 and 2024, most of it from Davis himself. Three of the four candidates who received PAC donations in 2023 returned them. In October 2024, Davis formed the Jeffersonian Party of Florida, which describes itself as advocating for “federal, constitutional, American government.” Its published principles call for ending U.S. alliances with NATO and the State of Israel, the creation of militias that operate at the state level “publicly and/or privately,” and a “return to the traditional understanding of equality” that the party frames as not requiring the destruction of “distinctions of nations and races.” The principles also elaborate positions on government structure, constitutional reform, and American symbols. Davis also founded the Collier County Jeffersonian Executive Committee, the only local third-party organization recognized by the Collier Supervisor of Elections. Davis is the first local third-party candidate to qualify in Collier County. ([campaign website](#); colliervotes.gov)

In October 2025, Davis filed a complaint with the Florida Elections Commission alleging that the Collier County Republican Executive Committee and its leadership violated Florida election law in the organization's financial reports, citing alleged irregularities in reported contributions and expenditures. On Jan. 13, 2025, Davis spoke during public comment at a Naples City Council workshop on Naples Pride's permit application for its June 2025 festival. According to Davis, "The debate was about whether the event should be permitted to happen at all, inside or outside, and if it was to happen, whether lewd behavior would be allowed in the public park, right in the heart of downtown Naples, and next to the children's playground." "I was personally invited to advocate against permitting the event by a Catholic friend," Davis said. The council voted 5-2 on Jan. 15, 2025, to approve the permit, with restrictions. Davis has appeared before the Collier County Board of County Commissioners on multiple occasions in public comment, challenging developer rezonings, growth management amendments, variances, and conditional uses. On August 2026, he spoke against a proposed amendment to the Conservation Collier program; a vote on the amendment at the meeting was delayed. ([campaign website](#); [Coastal Breeze News](#))

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Campaign Finances

The figures below reflect campaign finance activity reported through the filing period ending Aug. 21, 2026.

Chris Hall's Contributions

Hall raised \$79,141 from 119 donors, 70 percent of whom were from Collier County. Donors with unspecified or undisclosed occupations accounted for 35 percent of his contributions; real estate and construction sources for 32 percent, retired donors for 22 percent, and legal-industry sources for six percent.

Hall received \$5,500 from six political committees: four real estate industry political committees, the Collier Citizens for Responsible Government, and Friends of Amira Fox, the campaign committee of 20th Judicial Circuit State Attorney Amira Fox.

Cody Davis's Contributions

Davis's \$8,290 total included a \$1,413 contribution Davis made to his own campaign and came from six outside donors, two of whom were from Collier County. None of Davis's outside contributions came from real estate, construction, or legal sources; donors with unspecified or undisclosed occupations accounted for 86 percent, and retired donors for 14 percent.

Davis received \$4,327 from four contributions to two Jeffersonian Party committees, the Collier County Jeffersonian Executive Committee and the State Executive Committee of the Jeffersonian Party of Florida, the political party Davis founded.

Campaign finance data was compiled from the Collier County Supervisor of Elections campaign finance filings using Claude Cowork and cross-checked against source records by the author. Data
