

Who's Running for Florida Commissioner of Agriculture in the General Election

Republican incumbent Wilton Simpson and Democratic challenger Joey Mendoza Atkins, along with one write-in candidate, are competing for Florida Commissioner of Agriculture in the Nov. 3, 2026, general election. Simpson was elected to the office in 2022 and is seeking a second term. The winner will serve a four-year term as one of the three elected members of the Florida Cabinet, overseeing the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services. Wilton Simpson

Republican incumbent Wilton Simpson was born Jun. 28, 1966, in Lakeland, Florida. He has worked in his family's businesses, Simpson Environmental Services and Simpson Farms, a private, family-owned farming and large-scale egg-laying operation, for more than four decades. ([Wikipedia](#))

Simpson served in the Florida Senate representing District 18 (2012-2016) and District 10 (2016-2022), and was elected President of the Florida Senate for the 2020-2022 term. As Senate President, he championed the Right to Farm Act, Florida's Greenbelt tax-classification laws, and the Florida Wildlife Corridor Act ([Ballotpedia](#); [Wikipedia](#)).

Simpson was elected Florida Commissioner of Agriculture in 2022 with 59.3% of the vote and took office Jan. 3, 2023, succeeding Nikki Fried. In Jan. 2025, he was involved in a public dispute with Gov. Ron DeSantis over illegal immigration enforcement legislation; DeSantis nonetheless endorsed Simpson's 2026 re-election bid ([Tampa Bay Times](#), 1/29/25; [The Floridian](#), 6/9/26).

Simpson is married to Kathy Shotts Simpson and has two adult children and two grandchildren. He is an advocate for the PACE Center for Girls, and he and his wife worked to establish the Simpson Breast Health Center at AdventHealth Zephyrhills (wiltonsimpson.com).

Platform

Simpson's [campaign website](#) organizes his record and platform into eight categories, confirmed unchanged from the primary post as of Sept. 13, 2026:

- Agriculture
- Free Florida
- Public Safety
- Families
- Veterans
- Economic Freedom
- Environment
- Education

Endorsements

According to [Simpson's campaign website](#), his endorsers include:

- **National and state leaders:** President Donald Trump, Gov. Ron DeSantis, Florida House Speaker-Designate Sam Garrison, State Attorney Ginger Bowden Madden, and school-choice advocate John Kirtley.
- **Law enforcement:** 61 of Florida's 67 sheriffs, including Collier County Sheriff Kevin Rambosk, and the Florida Professional Firefighters.
- **Agriculture, business, and civic organizations:** Associated Industries of Florida, the Florida Chamber of Commerce, Florida Citrus Mutual, the Florida Farm Bureau PAC, the Florida Forestry Association, the Florida Nursery, Growers & Landscape Association, the Florida Thoroughbred Breeders' and Owners' Association, United Dairy Farmers of Florida, the Florida Young Republicans, and 24 past presidents of the Florida Cattlemen's Association.

Joey Mendoza Atkins

Joey Mendoza Atkins earned a bachelor’s degree in political science from Florida Atlantic University and a JD from the University of Toledo College of Law in 2013. He has worked as a lawyer “protecting families through family law cases, as well as providing Legal Aid with a focus on migrant farm workers” ([campaign website](#)). He has also worked as a sports agent ([Ballotpedia](#)).

Atkins ran unsuccessfully for the U.S. House in Florida’s 26th Congressional District in 2024. He briefly entered the 2026 U.S. Senate special election in Florida before withdrawing from that primary, then qualified for the Commissioner of Agriculture race on June 12, 2026. Minor Candidates

One write-in candidate also qualified for the Nov. 3, 2026, general election ballot. In Florida, the name of a qualified write-in candidate does not appear on the printed ballot.

Campaign Finances

Political committees may raise and spend money without limit to support or oppose candidates, but Florida law caps direct transfers from a committee to a candidate's own campaign account at \$3,000 per election, with the primary and general treated as separate elections. Wilton Simpson's Contributions

Wilton Simpson raised a total of \$1.2 million (monetary contributions plus in-kind support) from 744 donors. Ninety-seven percent of his monetary contributions came from Florida donors. Of that, \$93 thousand came from political committees giving directly to his campaign account.

Separately, Friends of Wilton Simpson, Florida Green PAC, Future Florida, and Home Grown PAC, political committees he chairs, have raised \$46.3 million combined since their formation, of which \$22.1 million remains available.

Joey Mendoza Atkins's Contributions

Joey Mendoza Atkins's campaign has taken in \$15 thousand in total: \$7 thousand in monetary contributions plus an \$8 thousand personal loan from the candidate. Sixty-seven percent of his monetary contributions came from Florida donors, with the remainder from out of state. The \$7 thousand in contributions came from 310 donors, all small-dollar; he received no contributions from political committees and has no affiliated committee.
