

# Who's Running for Florida Governor in the 2026 General Election

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Republican U.S. Rep. Byron Donalds, Democratic former U.S. Rep. David Jolly, and several minor candidates are competing for Florida governor in the Nov. 3, 2026, general election. Gov. Ron DeSantis is term-limited under Florida's two-consecutive-term constitutional limit, making this an open-seat race. The winner will serve a four-year term as Florida's chief executive officer. In this post, I summarize the backgrounds and stated priorities of the two candidates seeking Florida's governorship, along with their endorsements, recent news coverage, and campaign finance data, to help voters prepare to cast their ballots. 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## Byron Donalds

Republican nominee Byron Donalds was born Oct. 28, 1978, and raised in Brooklyn, NY, in a single-parent household. He graduated from Florida State University in 2002 with a degree in finance and marketing and worked in the finance, insurance, and banking industries in Southwest Florida. Donalds served in the Florida House of Representatives, District 80, from 2016 to 2020, where he led the effort to enact Hope Scholarships, chaired the House Insurance and Banking Subcommittee, and was appointed by Governor Rick Scott to the Board of Trustees for Florida SouthWestern State College. Since January 2021 he has represented Florida's 19th Congressional District in the U.S. House, succeeding Francis Rooney, and served as a surrogate for the 2024 Trump presidential campaign. He announced his campaign for Governor on Feb. 25, 2025, becoming the first major

Republican candidate to enter the race, after President Trump had already endorsed him. He lives in Naples with his wife, Erika, and their three sons. ([campaign site](#); [WUSF](#))

## Platform

Donalds's campaign website has a main "On the Issues" page with seven named priorities ([campaign site](#)):

- Enact the Trump Agenda
- Fight Illegal Immigration
- Make Florida More Affordable
- Expand Economic Opportunity
- Protect Our Conservative Values
- Improve Our Infrastructure
- Preserve Our Environment

There are also eight additional named policy pages: LaunchPad; Most Transparent Government in America; Insurer Scorecard; Zero Tolerance, Zero Dollars; Your Doctor, Your Price; Florida Means Business; Student Success Plans; and Read to Succeed. ([campaign site](#))

## Endorsements

As of Sept. 7, 2026, his campaign website listed the following endorsements:

- **National figures:** President Donald Trump, Donald Trump Jr., Charlie Kirk, Elon Musk, Louisiana Gov. Jeff Landry, and Arkansas Gov. Sarah Huckabee Sanders.
- **Associations:** The Club for Growth, Associated Industries of Florida, and the Florida Restaurant and Lodging Association.
- **Members of Congress:** House Speaker Mike Johnson, Majority Leader Steve Scalise, Majority Whip Tom Emmer, Conference Chair Lisa McClain, Leadership Chair Elise Stefanik, and Sens. Rick Scott and Ted Cruz, along with 19 Florida U.S. House members, including Mario Diaz-Balart, whose district includes part of Collier County.
- **Sheriffs:** More than 35 Florida sheriffs, including Grady Judd, Chris Nocco, Lee County's Carmine Marceno, and Collier County's Kevin Rambosk.
- **Florida Legislature:** Nine state senators and more than 60 state representatives, including House Speaker Danny Perez and Collier County's Yvette Benarroch, Adam Botana, and Lauren Melo.

In addition, Gov. Ron DeSantis endorsed Donalds on Sept. 3, 2026, despite past tensions between the two. ([WLRN](#)) Ashley Moody, Senate President-Designate Jim Boyd, and House Speaker-Designate

Sam Garrison have also endorsed Donalds, though they are not currently listed on his campaign site. ([Florida Politics](#); [Florida's Voice](#))

## Legal Matters

In a civil lawsuit filed July 8, 2026, in Collier County Circuit Court, Kelly Mason, a Collier County School Board member and founder of Mason Classical Academy, alleges Donalds confronted and threatened her at a Naples grocery store in August 2022, after learning she was involved in litigation against his wife, Erika Donalds, over the charter school Mason founded. The suit alleges Donalds told her he could “crush” or “finish” her, and cites video reportedly showing him telling her to “stop the lawsuits.” Mason is seeking a jury trial and damages. Donalds’s campaign has called the suit “a baseless, politically motivated attack and shameful publicity stunt,” saying Mason “has a long history of unsuccessful litigation against the Donalds family.” ([Florida Phoenix](#)) As of Sept. 7, 2026, no further developments have been reported since the suit was filed, and no trial date has been set.

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## David Jolly

Democratic nominee David Jolly, 53, was born Oct. 31, 1972, in Dunedin, FL. He earned a bachelor's degree from Emory University in 1994 and a Juris Doctor from George Mason University in 2001. Jolly worked for Republican U.S. Representative Bill Young full time from 1995 to 2006 in various positions, with a brief break for six months in 2001 when he worked at a Washington securities firm. From 2007 until first running for Congress in 2013, he worked as a lobbyist, during which time he made political donations to both Republicans and Democrats. He served as the Republican U.S. Representative for Florida's 13th Congressional District from 2014 to 2017, when he was defeated for reelection by Charlie Crist. ([Wikipedia](#))

After leaving Congress, Jolly practiced law and spent nearly a decade as a political analyst for NBC and MSNBC. He left the Republican Party in 2018 amid frustration with the party's direction under Donald Trump, registering with no party affiliation and later with the Forward Party (2022-2025), before registering as a Democrat in April 2025. ([Wikipedia](#))

He is a fifth-generation Floridian and the son of a minister. He and his wife Laura are raising their family in Pinellas County. He officially announced his campaign for Governor as a Democrat on June 5, 2025. His running mate is former U.S. Rep. Gwen Graham, who represented Florida's 2nd Congressional District, was the runner-up in the 2018 Democratic gubernatorial primary, and served alongside Jolly in Congress, where they co-sponsored legislation opposing oil drilling in the Gulf of Mexico. 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## Polling and Campaign Finance Data

Recent polling shows Donalds leading Jolly by low to mid single digits. An average of the two most recent pre-primary election surveys tracked by 270toWin ([James Madison Institute](#), 8/6/26; [University of North Florida](#), 7/20/26) puts Donalds at 45.5 percent and Jolly at 39.5 percent. ([270toWin](#))

More recently, after the primary, the Cook Political Report moved its rating of the race from Solid Republican to Likely Republican on Aug. 27, 2026, citing Jolly's fundraising disadvantage as the main obstacle to a more competitive contest. ([Cook Political Report](#); [Florida Politics](#))

Political committees may raise and spend money without limit to support or oppose candidates, but Florida law caps direct transfers from a committee to a candidate's own campaign account at \$3,000 per election, with the primary and general treated as separate elections. ### Byron Donalds's Contributions

Byron Donalds raised a total of \$14.0 million (monetary contributions plus in-kind support) from 40,355 individual and institutional donors. Seventy-one percent of his monetary contributions came from Florida donors. Of that, \$327,250 in contributions came from political committees giving directly to his campaign account. Nearly all of his in-kind support, 98 percent of the \$1.5 million total, came from the Republican Party of Florida.

Separately, Friends of Byron Donalds PAC, a political committee supporting his campaign, has raised \$100.2 million since its formation, of which \$50.5 million remains available.

### David Jolly's Contributions

David Jolly raised a total of \$7.0 million from 46,481 individual and institutional donors. Eighty-four percent of his monetary contributions came from Florida donors. Of that, \$27,750 in contributions came from political committees giving directly to his campaign account. Nearly all of his in-kind support, 97 percent of the \$268,586 total, came from the Florida Democratic Party.

Separately, Florida 2026, a political committee supporting his campaign, has raised \$4.1 million since its formation, of which \$717,520 remains available. Jolly founded the committee but does not chair it.
